

Year 4 History Assessment: Life in the Iron Age

Learning objective: To demonstrate knowledge and understanding of life, settlements, and technology during the Iron Age in Britain.

Ellie the elephant has been studying the Iron Age. She discovered that people in Britain stopped using bronze for tools and began using iron, which was stronger and more durable. They lived in roundhouses with thatched roofs and often built large, defensive settlements on high ground to protect their families and livestock. These people were skilled farmers, metalworkers, and traders who used coins or swapped goods to get what they needed.
