- People began lighting bonfires across London on the very first night the plot was stopped to show their relief and loyalty.
- Today, we enjoy colourful fireworks and sparklers to represent the gunpowder that was never set off, keeping the tradition alive through light and sound.

Did you know? Did you know? Even though we light fireworks today to celebrate, the original plot was to use 36 barrels of gunpowder hidden beneath the Houses of Parliament. Thankfully, the plan was discovered before any harm was done!
