

Rosa's Spanish Number Market

Learning objective: To recognise and write Spanish numbers from 1 to 20 and apply them to simple currency calculations.

Rosa the parrot is helping at the school market. Read the price tags on the items below. Match the Spanish number word to the correct digit, then calculate the total cost in pounds (£) for the items Rosa needs to buy.

Word bank: uno (1) · dos (2) · tres (3) · cuatro (4) · cinco (5) · seis (6) · siete (7) · ocho (8) · nueve (9) · diez (10) · once (11) · doce (12) · trece (13) · catorce (14) · quince (15)

1. Rosa wants to buy 'tres' apples and 'cuatro' oranges. If each item costs £1, what is the total cost in Spanish? Write the final number as a word. (2 marks)

2. Match the Spanish word 'quince' to its numerical digit and state how many pounds (£) it represents. (2 marks)

3. If a bag of seeds costs 'seis' pounds and a sunflower pot costs 'siete' pounds, what is the total cost? Write the sum in digits and the total in Spanish words. (2 marks)

4. Translate 'once' into the English digit and write a sentence explaining how many coins you would need if each coin was worth £1. (2 marks)

5. Rosa picks 'diez' strawberries and eats 'dos'. How many are left? Write the remaining number as a Spanish word. (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a market stall with fifteen pieces of fruit. Label five of the fruits using the correct Spanish number words from the word bank.



Extension challenge: Research how to say the numbers 16 to 20 in Spanish. Can you write a number sentence using these larger numbers for a friend to solve?
