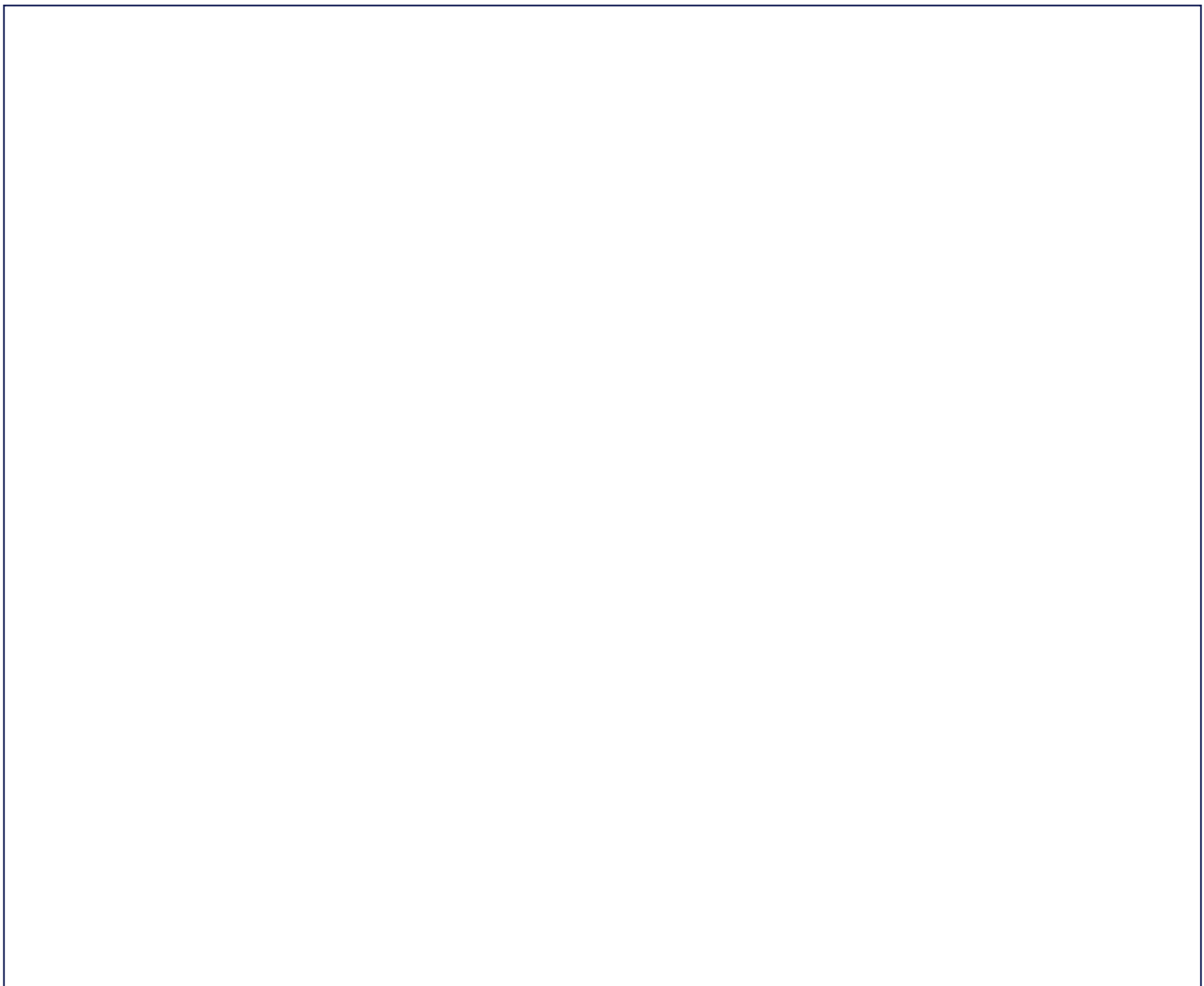


Mapping My World: Physical and Human Geography

Learning objective: To distinguish between human and physical geography and identify key features in a landscape.

Finn the dolphin is helping us explore the difference between the natural world and the things people build. In the big drawing box, create a landscape that includes both physical geography (natural features) and human geography (man-made features). Use the word bank to label your drawing!

Draw: A wide-angle landscape scene. The drawing should be split between natural elements (physical geography) like mountains, forests, and rivers, and man-made elements (human geography) like roads, houses, and bridges. The style should be a clear, colourful map-like illustration.



Label words: Mountain · River · Forest · Coastline · Village · Bridge · Road · Farm

Steps:

1. Step 1: Draw a large physical feature in the background, such as a mountain or a range of hills.
2. Step 2: Add a natural water feature, like a winding river or a coastline, flowing through your scene.
3. Step 3: Draw a human feature that allows people to cross your water feature (e.g. a bridge).
4. Step 4: Add a settlement, such as a small village or a farm, with houses and roads.
5. Step 5: Label one physical feature and one human feature using words from the word bank.

6. Explain why people often build human settlements (like villages) near physical features like rivers.
7. If you wanted to build a new shop in your drawing, where would you put it to make it easy for people to reach?
