- Many Muslims start their Eid day with a special prayer called Salat al-Eid, often performed in a mosque or a large open space.
- Giving to charity, known as Zakat, is an important part of Eid to ensure that people in need can also join in the celebrations.
- Families celebrate by wearing their finest new clothes, visiting relatives, and sharing delicious meals with friends.
- It is a tradition for children to receive gifts or money, such as a few rupees and paise, as a treat from their elders.

Did you know? Did you know? The date of Eid changes every year because the Islamic calendar is based on the cycles of the moon. Muslims look for the new crescent moon in the sky to know exactly when the celebration begins!
