

Remembrance Day: A Time to Remember with Leo the Lion

Learning objective: To understand the significance of Remembrance Day, the symbolism of the poppy, and why we mark the 11th of November.

Read the information provided by Leo the Lion carefully and answer the ten questions below. Good luck!

Remembrance Day is held on 11th November each year. It marks the day in 1918 when the First World War ended. At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, an agreement called an Armistice was signed to stop the fighting. We wear red poppies to remember the brave soldiers who lost their lives in wars. The poppy became a symbol of hope because it was one of the first flowers to grow in the muddy, destroyed fields after the fighting stopped. On this day, people often stand for a two-minute silence to show respect and think about those who helped keep our country safe. It is a time for us to think about how we can build a world of peace for the future.
