Learning objective: To test understanding of the key elements and traditions of Diwali as part of the Year 4 English curriculum.

Answer the following questions based on the Diwali story passage. Each question is worth 1 mark.

Diwali, also known as the Festival of Lights, is a Hindu festival celebrated with great joy and enthusiasm. It usually falls in October or November. One of the most important aspects of Diwali is the lighting of lamps or candles to symbolize the victory of good over evil. Devotees light Rangoli, which are intricate patterns made of colored powder, at the entrance of their homes to welcome Goddess Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth and prosperity. Fireworks are also a part of the celebration, adding to the festive atmosphere. People exchange sweets and candies, and perform puja (prayers) to thank the goddess for the blessings of wealth and prosperity. Houses are decorated with lights and flowers, and the festival is marked by great enthusiasm and happiness.
