- Every compelling story begins with an 'inciting incident'—a moment that disrupts the protagonist's normal life and sparks the journey.
- Using fronted adverbials, such as 'In the blink of an eye,' helps to build suspense and provides the reader with clear information about time, place, or manner.
- A well-crafted setting uses sensory imagery—what can be seen, heard, felt, smelled, or tasted—to transport the reader directly into the scene.
- Characters are brought to life through their dialogue and actions, rather than just descriptions; show the reader how they feel instead of simply telling them.
- The climax is the peak of the narrative tension, where the main character must face their greatest challenge before the story moves toward a resolution.
