

A Celebration of Stories with Pip

Learning objective: To retrieve information from a text and make inferences about the significance of World Book Day.

Read the passage carefully and answer the questions below. Use full sentences where appropriate.

World Book Day is a highly anticipated event in the school calendar, dedicated to the magical power of reading. For Pip the bookworm, it is the most important day of the year. Pip believes that books are portals to distant lands, allowing children to step into the shoes of someone entirely different. Across the country, classrooms transform into hubs of creativity.
