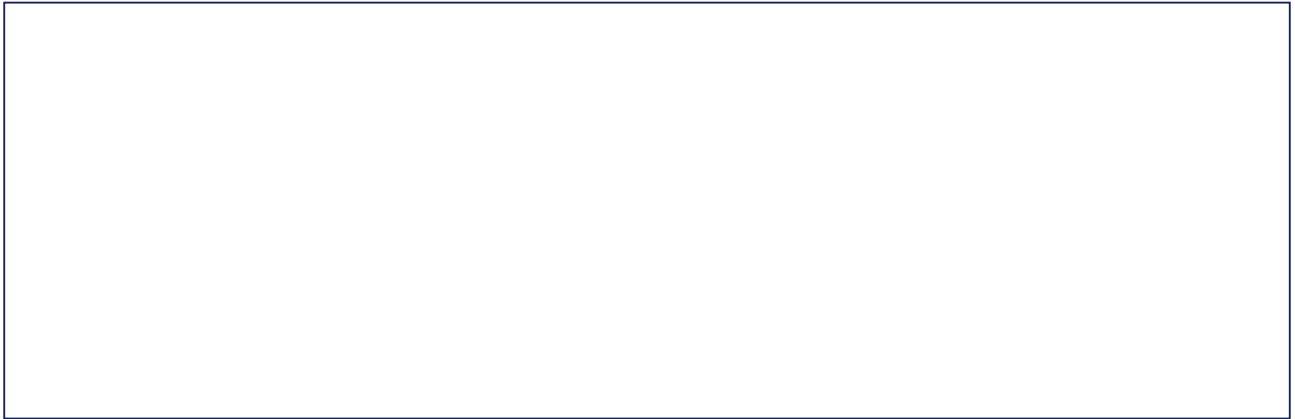
7. If a story takes place in a magical forest during the Victorian era, what is the 'magical forest' called? (1 mark)
