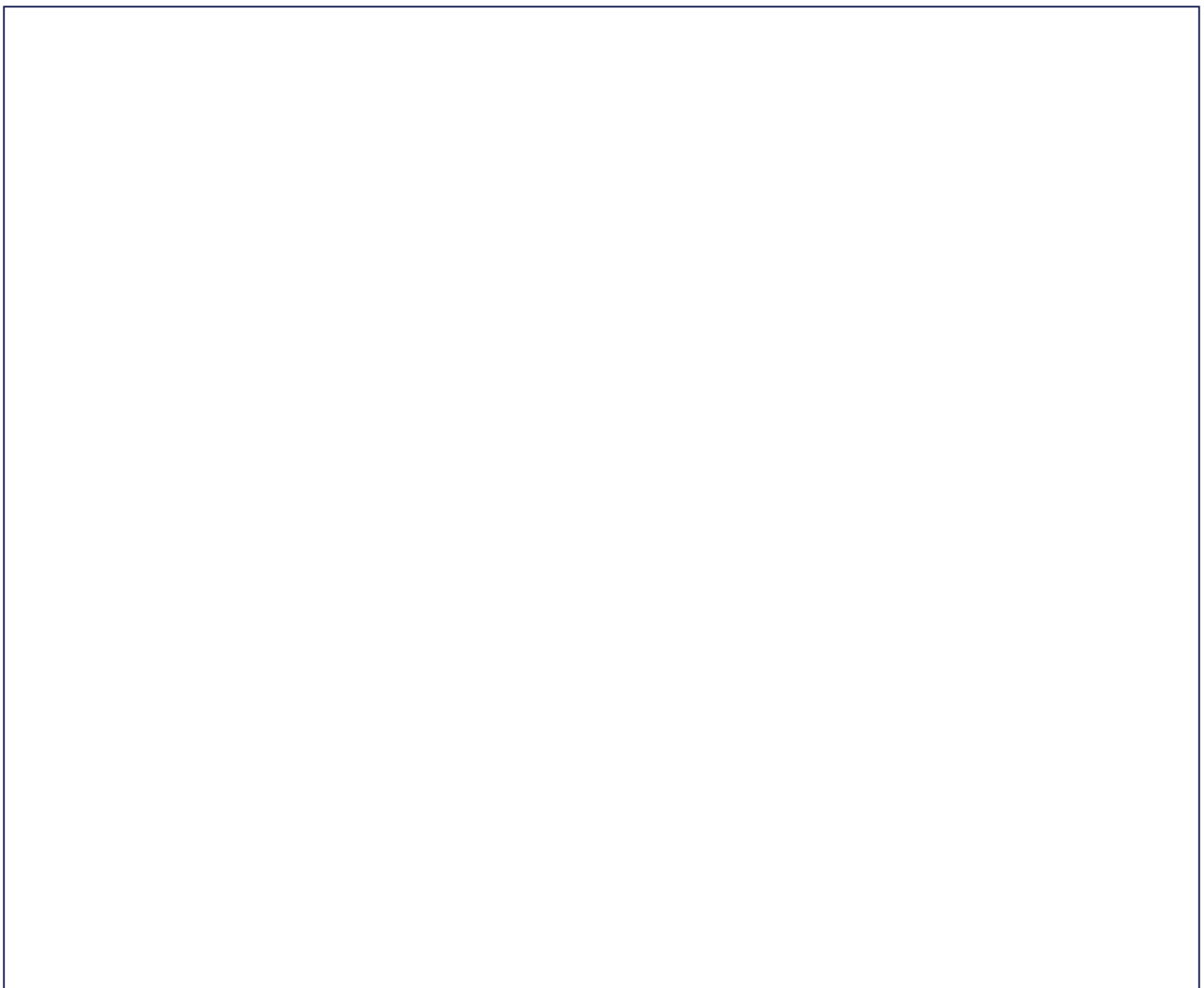


Exploring Our Coasts with Finn the Dolphin

Learning objective: To identify and label key physical features of a coastline, including cliffs, beaches, and bays.

Follow the drawing prompt to create your own coastal landscape. Use the word bank to label the features you have drawn to show how Finn the Dolphin sees the coastline from the sea.

Draw: Create a landscape drawing of a coastline. Start by drawing the sea along the bottom of the page. Include a high, vertical cliff on the left side of your drawing. Next to the cliff, draw a sandy beach that curves inwards to form a bay. Add a headland (a piece of land sticking out into the sea) on the right. If you have space, add a small arch shape carved into the cliff. Keep your style clear and use labels to point to each specific feature you have drawn.



Label words: Cliff · Beach · Bay · Headland · Arch · Sea · Cave

Steps:

1. Draw a tall, steep rock face on one side of your page. Label this as a 'Cliff'.
2. Draw a curved area where the sea meets the land. Label this as a 'Bay'.
3. Draw a hole in the bottom of your cliff that looks like a tunnel. Label this as a 'Cave'.
4. Explain why you think the waves might be stronger against the headland than in the bay.

5. Describe one way that humans might use the beach area for leisure activities.
