Learning objective: To identify and describe the differences between human and physical geography, and understand how they interact within a landscape.

Read each question carefully. Write your answers clearly in the spaces provided. Try to use the words from the word bank to help you explain your ideas.

1. What is the definition of 'physical geography'? Give one example of a physical feature. (2 marks)

2. What is the definition of 'human geography'? Give one example of a human feature. (2 marks)

3. Finn the dolphin is swimming along a coastline. Is a coastline a human or a physical feature? Explain why. (2 marks)

4. Explain the difference between a 'rural' area and an 'urban' area. (4 marks)

5. Max the monkey is looking at a map of a town. He sees a bridge, a railway station, and a shopping centre. Why are these considered human geography features? (3 marks)

6. How might a physical feature, such as a steep mountain or a wide river, affect where humans decide to build a settlement? Give two reasons. (4 marks)

7. Imagine you are designing a new village. Describe where you would place your houses, shops, and roads in relation to a river and a forest. Explain why you chose these locations to make the village a good place to live. (8 marks)
