1. Name one significant historical figure from the word bank and state one thing they are famous for. (2 marks)

2. Mary Seacole travelled to the Crimean War to help soldiers. What was her profession, and why was her work considered so important? (3 marks)

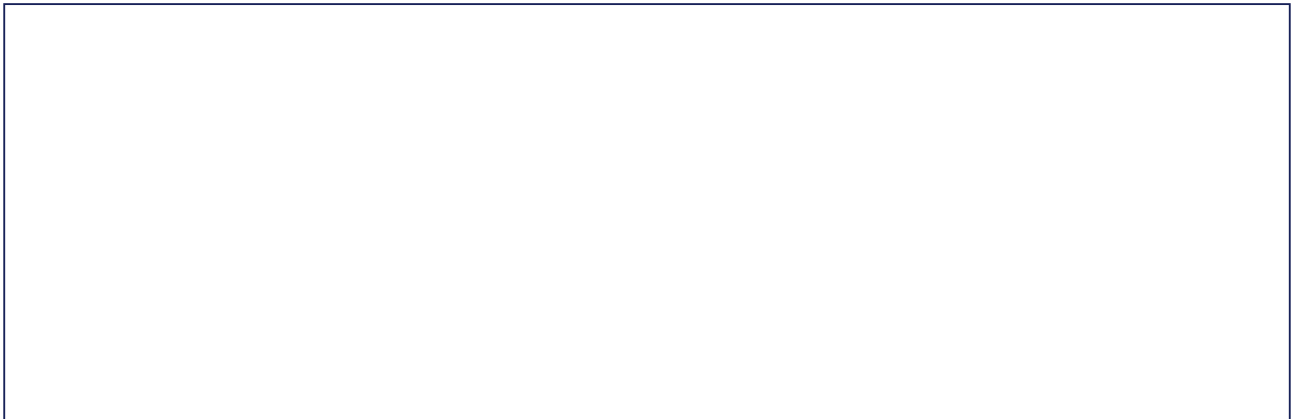
3. Walter Tull was a pioneer in two different areas of British history. Can you name both areas? (2 marks)

4. Explain why it is important for historians to study the lives of people like Mary Prince, who fought against the injustice of slavery. (4 marks)

5. How did these historical figures show 'resilience' in the face of the challenges they encountered during their lifetimes? (4 marks)

6. Ellie the Elephant is writing a story about a person from history who inspires her. Choose one person from Black history and write a short account (5-6 sentences) explaining why they are an inspirational figure. Include details about what they achieved and how they influenced the world. (10 marks)
