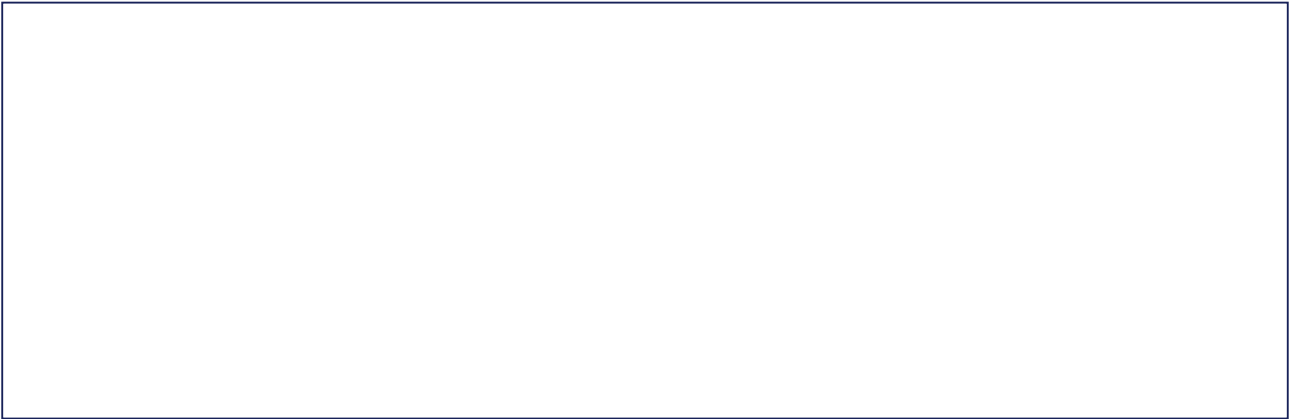
7. 7. What feature helps break the text into clear sections with titles? (1 mark)
