Learning objective: To identify and describe the physical and human characteristics of the Arctic and Antarctic regions.

1. Location: Where are the Arctic and Antarctic regions located on a world map? (2 marks)

2. Climate: Describe the typical weather in the polar regions. How does it differ from where you live? (3 marks)

3. Wildlife: Which animals live in these regions and how have they adapted to survive the freezing cold? (4 marks)

4. Physical Features: Describe two physical features you would find in the polar regions (such as ice sheets or tundra). (3 marks)

5. Human Life: Who lives in the Arctic region, and how do they ensure they stay warm and find food? (3 marks)

6. Comparing Regions: What is one major difference between the North Pole (Arctic) and the South Pole (Antarctica)? (2 marks)

Extension challenge: Imagine you are a scientist visiting the poles. Write a short paragraph explaining why it is important to protect the polar ice caps from melting.
