

Bonfire Night Sparkle Quiz

Learning objective: To develop reading comprehension and historical vocabulary skills related to the Gunpowder Plot and Bonfire Night traditions.

Read the historical context passage carefully before answering the ten questions. Ensure your spelling is accurate and use your best handwriting.

In 1605, a group of men plotted against King James I in an event known as the Gunpowder Plot. Their plan was to blow up the Houses of Parliament. However, the plot was discovered, and Guy Fawkes was found guarding the explosives. Ever since that night, the 5th of November has been marked in Britain with bonfires and fireworks. Traditionally, some people build a 'guy'—an effigy made of old clothes—to place on top of the bonfire. It is a time for communities to gather, watch displays, and enjoy treats like toffee apples while remembering this strange chapter in British history.
