

The Art of Storycrafting with Pip

Learning objective: To develop reading comprehension skills by identifying descriptive language and inferring character motivations in a narrative text.

Read the passage below carefully and answer the questions. Make sure to use full sentences where required.

Pip the caterpillar sat atop a curled oak leaf, surrounded by a mountain of scattered notebooks. Pip was not just any caterpillar; he was a collector of magnificent words. He believed that every story needed a dash of magic to truly sparkle. 'Writing is like painting a picture with letters,' Pip chirped, dipping his tiny pen into a pot of shimmering ink. 1. What tools does Pip use to write his stories? (2 marks)

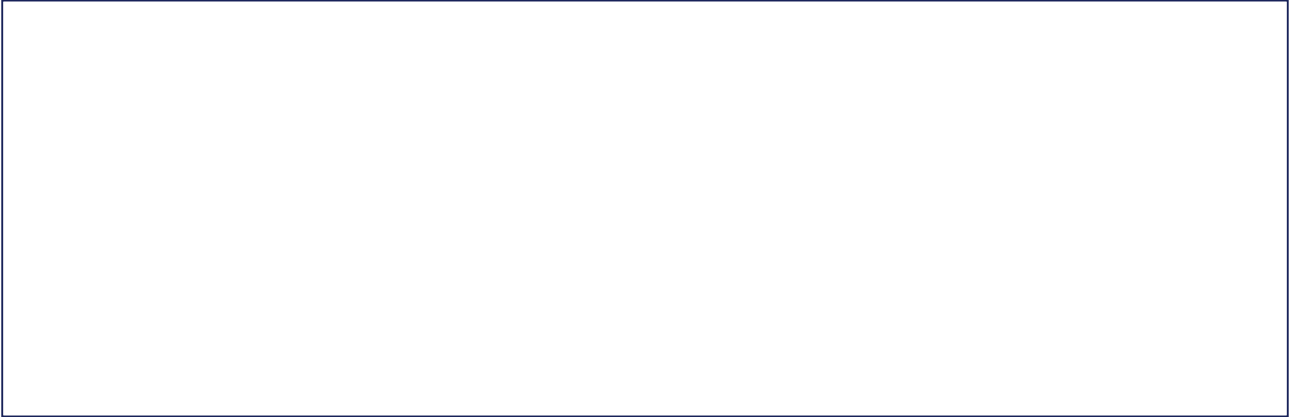
2. Where is Pip sitting at the beginning of the passage? (1 mark)

4. How does Pip feel about the process of writing? (2 marks)

5. Do you agree with Pip's idea that writing is like painting a picture? Explain your reasoning. (3 marks)
