- **Fronted adverbials** are words or phrases placed at the beginning of a sentence to describe how, when, or where an action occurs. Remember: always follow them with a comma!
- **Cohesive devices**, such as '*furthermore*' or '*consequently*', act as bridges between your paragraphs, ensuring your ideas flow logically and maintain the reader's interest.
