Learning objective: To identify, use, and improve sentence structures, including the use of relative clauses, fronted adverbials, and multi-clause sentences.

Read each question carefully. Use your knowledge of grammar to rewrite, identify, and expand sentences as requested by Max the monkey and Kit the fox.

1. Max has written a simple sentence: 'The monkey climbed the tree.' Add a relative clause starting with 'who' or 'which' to give more detail about the monkey or the tree. (2 marks)

2. Kit needs to add a fronted adverbial to this sentence: 'The fox solved the puzzle.' Write a new version of this sentence starting with a fronted adverbial of time or manner. (2 marks)

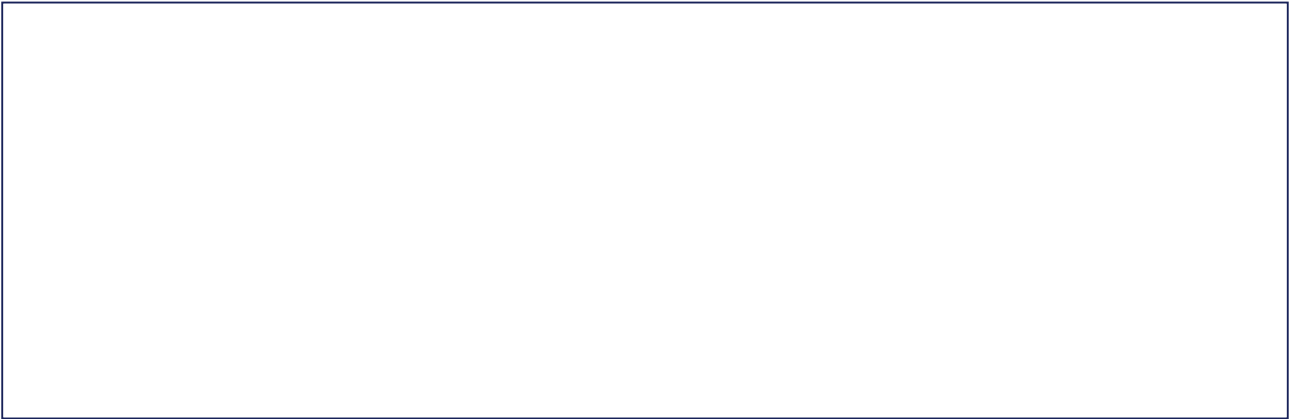
3. Join these two sentences using a subordinating conjunction (e.g., although, because, since): 'It started to rain. We finished our maths homework.' (2 marks)

4. Identify the main clause and the relative clause in this sentence: 'The book, which was very heavy, sat on the wooden table.' (2 marks)

5. Rewrite the following sentence to include a parenthesis using commas to add extra information about the subject: 'The elephant walked to the river.' (2 marks)

6. Explain why it is helpful to use different sentence lengths in a paragraph when writing a story. (2 marks)
