

Rosa's French Number Market

Learning objective: To read, write, and calculate with French numbers 1 to 50, applying them to real-world monetary contexts.

Rosa the parrot is helping out at a local market stall. Use the French number words to help customers calculate the total cost of their items. Match the French number written on the price tag to the numerical value in pounds, then complete the calculation in your exercise book.

Word bank: dix (10) · douze (12) · quinze (15) · vingt (20) · vingt-cinq (25) · trente (30) · quarante (40) · cinquante (50)

1. A customer buys an apple for 'dix' pence and a pear for 'quinze' pence. Write the total cost in words in French. (2 marks)

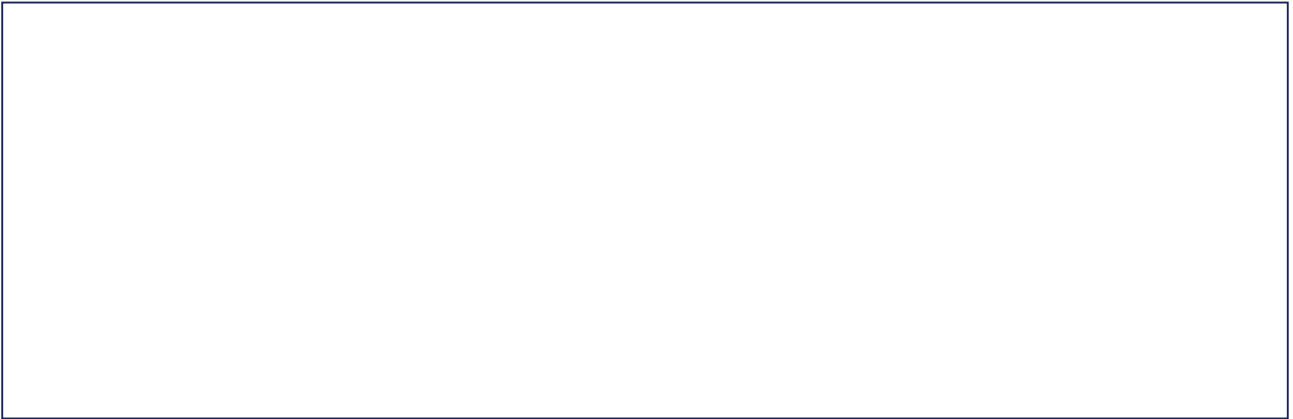
2. A notebook costs 'quarante' pence. If you pay with a 'cinquante' pence coin, how much change do you get? Write the answer in French words. (2 marks)

3. Rosa has 'vingt' stickers. She buys 'douze' more. How many stickers does she have in total? Write the number in French. (2 marks)

4. A pencil costs 'vingt-cinq' pence. If you buy two pencils, what is the total cost in French words? (2 marks)

5. If a ruler costs 'trente' pence and you have 'cinquante' pence, can you afford the ruler? Explain your answer using French numbers. (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a market stall with three items. Label each item with a price tag using the French words from the word bank (e.g., 'vingt pence').



Extension challenge: Try to write a short dialogue between a customer and Rosa the parrot in French, using the phrase 'Je voudrais...' (I would like...) followed by an item and a price.
