

## Rosa's French Number Fact-File

*Learning objective: To identify and write French numbers from 1 to 100 accurately, using them in context to describe quantities.*

Help Rosa the parrot prepare for her French lesson! Use this fact-file to practise your French numbers. Fill in the boxes below by translating English numbers into French, creating your own maths word problems, and describing the number of items in a set.

*Word bank: un · deux · trois · quatre · cinq · six · sept · huit · neuf · dix · vingt · trente · quarante · cinquante · soixante · combien · plus · moins*

**1. Number Translation: Write the French words for the following numbers: 15, 24, 42, 60, and 75. (5 marks)**

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**2. Maths Challenge: Write a simple addition sum in French (e.g., 'dix plus cinq font quinze') and provide the answer in words. (3 marks)**

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**3. Quantity Description: Imagine you have a collection of items (e.g., pens, apples, or books). Write a sentence in French stating how many you have: 'J'ai [number] [item].' (2 marks)**

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**4. Price Tag Practice: If an item costs £30, how would you write that price in French? If it costs £55, how would you write that? (2 marks)**

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**5. Creative Counting: Create your own sequence of three numbers in French, increasing by 10 each time (e.g., 20, 30, 40). (2 marks)**

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*Extension challenge: Challenge: Research how to say numbers between 70 and 100 in French. Why are they trickier than the numbers 1 to 60? Write a short explanation for Rosa.*
