Answer Key: 1.C, 2.True, 3.River, 4.B, 5.True, 6.Infrastructure, 7.A, 8.False, 9.Settlement, 10.B. Explanation: Physical geography relates to natural processes (mountains, rivers), while human geography relates to how people shape the land (roads, buildings, farming).
