Learning objective: To understand and celebrate diversity within a community, recognising that our differences make our society stronger and more vibrant.

Read each question carefully and use your own experiences and knowledge to provide thoughtful, well-reasoned answers. Remember to use clear, respectful language.

In our world, everyone is unique. Just like a garden needs many different types of flowers, plants, and trees to thrive, our classrooms and neighbourhoods are better when they include people with different backgrounds, traditions, beliefs, and talents. Inclusion is about making sure everyone feels welcome, valued, and safe to be themselves. When we listen to others with empathy and respect their perspectives, we learn more about the world and ourselves.

1. Max the monkey believes that if everyone were exactly the same, life would be 'boring'. Explain why having a diverse group of friends might help you learn new skills or ideas that you wouldn't have discovered on your own. (2 marks)

2. Define the term 'Inclusion' in your own words. Why is it important that we actively work to make sure no one is left out during playtime or group work? (2 marks)

3. Pip the caterpillar loves learning new words from different languages. How can celebrating different cultural traditions, such as festivals or foods, help a community become more united? (2 marks)

4. Justify your answer: Is it possible to respect someone even if you disagree with their opinion? Explain how you would handle a situation where you and a classmate have completely different views on a topic. (3 marks)

5. Compare and contrast: Think about a 'diverse' community versus a 'uniform' community. What might be a challenge that occurs in a community where everyone thinks and acts exactly the same? (2 marks)

6. What might happen if someone in your class felt excluded because of a difference, such as a language they speak or a hobby they have? Suggest two specific actions you could take to make them feel included. (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a 'Community Mosaic'. Create a large picture showing a variety of people, hobbies, and traditions coming together to form one beautiful image. Use symbols or patterns that represent the unique 'tiles' that make up our society.



Extension challenge: Write a short poem or a persuasive speech titled 'The Strength in Our Differences'. Your goal is to convince a group of people that being different is not just acceptable, but something that should be actively celebrated and protected.
