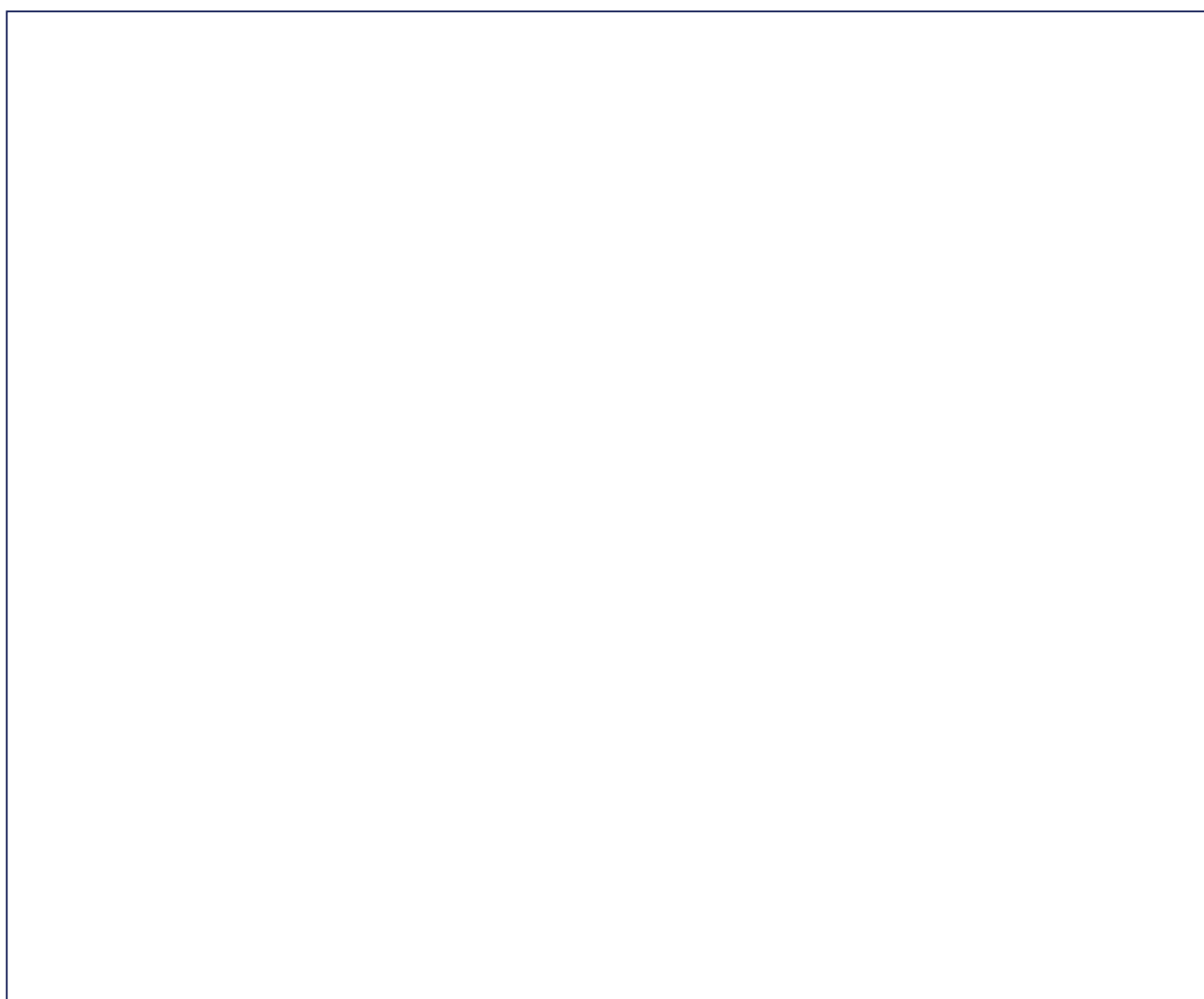


The Pillars of Friendship: An Illustrative Guide

Learning objective: To identify, demonstrate, and reflect upon the positive qualities that build and sustain healthy friendships.

Use the drawing space provided to create a scene featuring Pip the caterpillar and his friends. Illustrate a scenario that demonstrates a strong friendship, then label the positive qualities you have included using the word bank provided.

Draw: Draw a scene in a lush garden setting. Include Pip the caterpillar interacting with another character (such as Nova the owl or Zara the zebra). The scene should show them working together on a project or helping one another solve a problem. Use clear, detailed lines to show their expressions, ensuring their body language reflects the positive friendship qualities listed in the word bank. You may use colour to create a warm and inviting atmosphere.

Steps:

1. Explain why 'Active Listening' is a vital skill for maintaining a long-term friendship.
2. Compare and contrast a 'fair-weather friend' with a 'loyal friend'.
3. Identify one way you can show 'Empathy' if a friend is feeling sad about a mistake they made.

4. Justify why 'Honesty' is important even when it is difficult to tell the truth.
5. What might happen to a friendship if there is a lack of 'Respect' between two people?
6. Reflect on a personal experience: Describe one action you have taken this term to support a friend.
