

A Winter Celebration: Traditions and Sharing

Learning objective: To understand the significance of Christmas as a time for reflection, generosity, and community in the UK, while exploring the themes of charity and historical traditions.

Read the text carefully, then answer the questions below. Use full sentences and refer back to the text to support your answers.

As the winter solstice approaches, communities across the UK prepare for Christmas. While many see it as a time for festive lights and gifts, for others, it is a period of deep reflection and peace. Ellie the elephant, who loves history, explains that many traditions actually pre-date modern times. For instance, the use of evergreen plants like holly and ivy symbolises the endurance of life during the cold, dark winter. In the spirit of community, many people choose to focus on generosity. Local food banks see an increase in donations, and neighbours often check on those living alone to ensure they feel included. Whether it is sharing a meal that costs a modest £15 to prepare or simply writing a thoughtful card, the focus remains on kindness. Max the monkey notes that even the act of gift-giving involves careful maths, as families balance their budgets to ensure every present is chosen with care. Ultimately, Christmas serves as a gentle reminder that happiness is often found not in the items we receive, but in the warmth of our connections with one another.

1. According to the text, why do people use evergreen plants like holly and ivy during the winter? (2 marks)

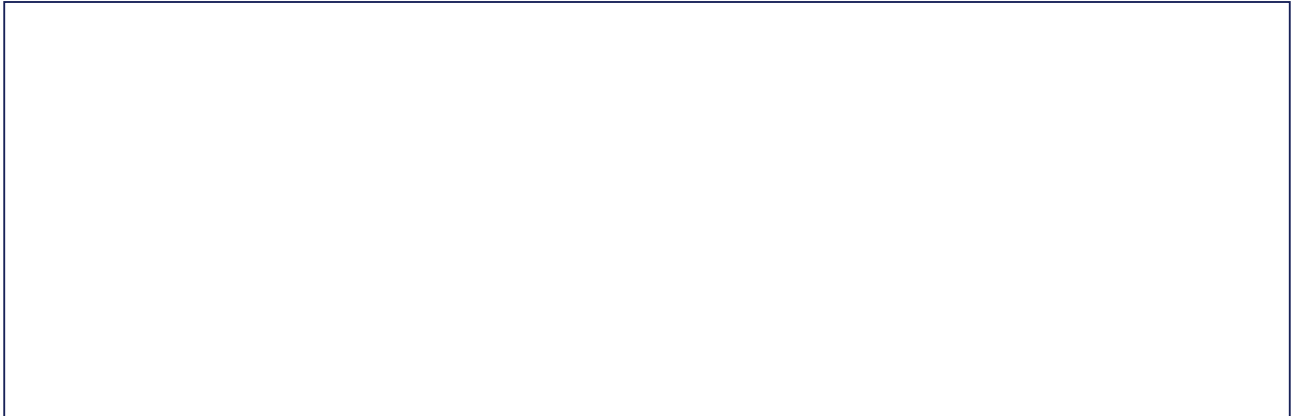
2. What are two examples of 'generosity' mentioned in the passage? (2 marks)

3. Why might some people feel that Christmas is a time for 'reflection' rather than just a time for receiving gifts? (3 marks)

4. Explain why the author mentions Max the monkey and his interest in maths in relation to gift-giving. (3 marks)

5. Do you agree that the most important part of Christmas is our 'connections with one another'? Justify your answer. (4 marks)
