

The Meaning of Christmas: A Sorting and Reflection Task

Learning objective: To understand the religious and secular traditions of Christmas and reflect on the values of generosity and community.

Max the monkey is helping organise a community winter celebration. He has a list of traditions and values, but he needs to sort them into two categories: 'Religious Significance' (related to the Christian celebration of the birth of Jesus) and 'Community Traditions' (social or secular customs). Read each item below and decide which category it belongs to, then write a short explanation for one of your choices.

Word bank: Nativity scene · Exchanging gifts · Midnight Mass · Decorating a tree · Reflecting on peace and goodwill · Singing carols · Sharing a meal with neighbours

1. Sort the items from the word bank into two groups: Religious Significance and Community Traditions. Explain why you placed one of these items in its chosen category. (6 marks)

2. Max wants to buy small gifts for his friends. He has £20.00. If he buys 4 books for £3.50 each, how much money will he have left for a card? (2 marks)

3. Why do you think sharing food with others is considered an important part of Christmas in many cultures? (2 marks)

4. In the story of the Nativity, why were the shepherds and the wise men significant to the event? (2 marks)

5. Choose one tradition from the list. How could you adapt this tradition to make it more inclusive for people who do not celebrate Christmas? (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a scene of a community celebration that shows both a traditional decoration (like a star or candle) and a sign of friendship or helping others.



Extension challenge: Research how 'Advent' is observed by Christians. Write a short diary entry from the perspective of someone preparing for Christmas, focusing on the theme of 'hope' or 'kindness'.
