

¡A Vestirse! (Getting Dressed in Spanish)

Join Rosa the parrot on a fashion adventure—discover how to talk about your favourite outfits in Spanish!

- To say 'I am wearing', we use the phrase 'Llevo puesto'. Try saying: 'Llevo puestos los pantalones azules' (I am wearing blue trousers).
- Remember that colours must match the noun. If a noun is feminine, like 'la camiseta', the colour often ends in 'a', such as 'la camiseta roja'.
- If you want to describe a plural item like shoes (los zapatos), the colour must also be plural: 'los zapatos negros'.
- Rosa's top tip: If you are not sure if a word is masculine or feminine, look at the article in front of it—'el' is for masculine, 'la' is for feminine.
- When asking someone what they are wearing, you can say: '¿Qué llevas puesto?'

Did you know? Did you know? In Spain, the way you describe clothes changes depending on whether the item is masculine or feminine! For example, we say 'un sombrero' (a hat) but 'una chaqueta' (a jacket). You have to listen carefully to the ending of the word to get it right!
