

Writing a Life Story: The Art of the Biography

- **Why do biographies always follow a chronological order?** It helps the reader understand how events in the subject's early life shaped who they eventually became.
- **Who is the 'subject' of a biography?** The subject is the real person whose life story is being told by the author.
- **Why is a biography written in the third-person?** Using 'he', 'she', or 'they' allows the writer to observe the subject's life from the outside and share a balanced view of their experiences.
- **What makes a biography engaging?** Including specific anecdotes—short, interesting stories about the person—helps the reader feel a real connection to the subject's personality.
- **What is the purpose of a biography?** Biographies aim to celebrate a person's achievements, document their challenges, and preserve their legacy for future generations.
