- A fronted adverbial is a word or phrase at the start of a sentence that describes how, when, or where an action happens. It must always be followed by a comma to separate it from the main clause.
- Conjunctions act as bridges. Use coordinating conjunctions (and, but, or) to join two equal ideas, or subordinating conjunctions (because, although, if, since) to add extra detail.
- Expanded noun phrases add colour and detail to your writing. By adding adjectives and determiners to a noun (e.g., 'the shimmering, silver moon'), you paint a vivid picture for your reader.
- Relative clauses start with words like 'who', 'which', or 'that' to provide extra information about a noun without needing to start a brand new sentence.
- Punctuation is the rhythm of your writing. Full stops, commas, and apostrophes for possession tell the reader exactly when to pause, breathe, and understand who owns what.
