3. Which famous river flows through north-eastern Africa and is often considered the longest river in the world? (1 mark)

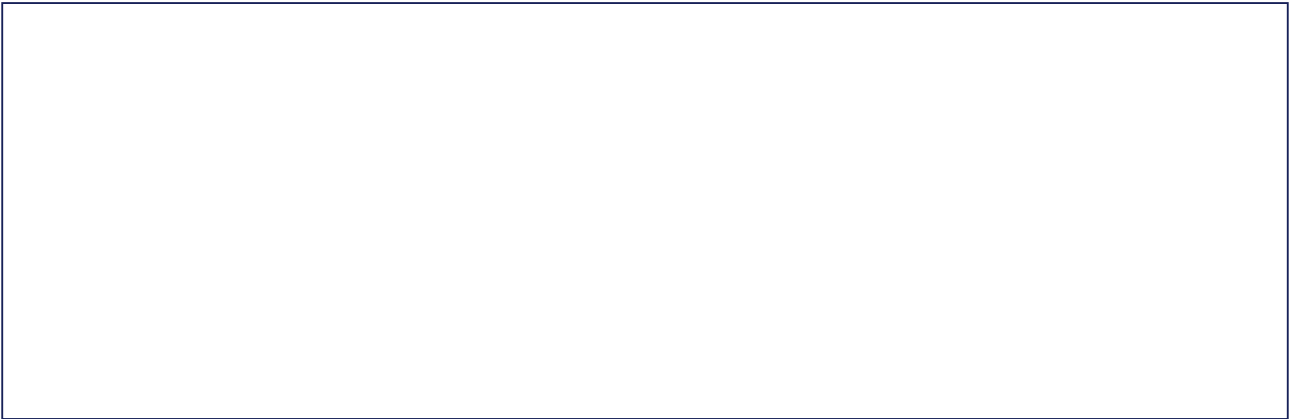
4. Describe the climate near the Equator in Africa. Why is it different from the climate in the desert regions? (4 marks)

5. Name two different types of biomes (habitats) found in Africa. (2 marks)

7. Why is it important to remember that Africa is a continent made of many diverse countries, rather than just one single place? (5 marks)
