Step into the story: Honour the past, inspire the future!

- Mary Seacole was a pioneering nurse who travelled to the Crimean War at her own expense to care for wounded soldiers, establishing the 'British Hotel' to provide comfort and medicine.
- Walter Tull was a professional footballer who became the first Black officer to lead white troops into battle during the First World War, showing immense bravery and leadership.
- The Windrush generation refers to the people who arrived in Britain from the Caribbean between 1948 and 1971, helping to rebuild the country's public services and culture after the Second World War.
- Olaudah Equiano was an influential writer and abolitionist who lived in the 18th century, using his autobiography to show the world the injustice of the slave trade.
- Black history is not just about the past; it is a celebration of modern innovators, artists, scientists, and leaders who continue to shape our world today.

It was organised by Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, a special projects officer for the Greater London Council, who wanted to ensure that the contributions of Black people to British history were acknowledged and celebrated throughout the year.
