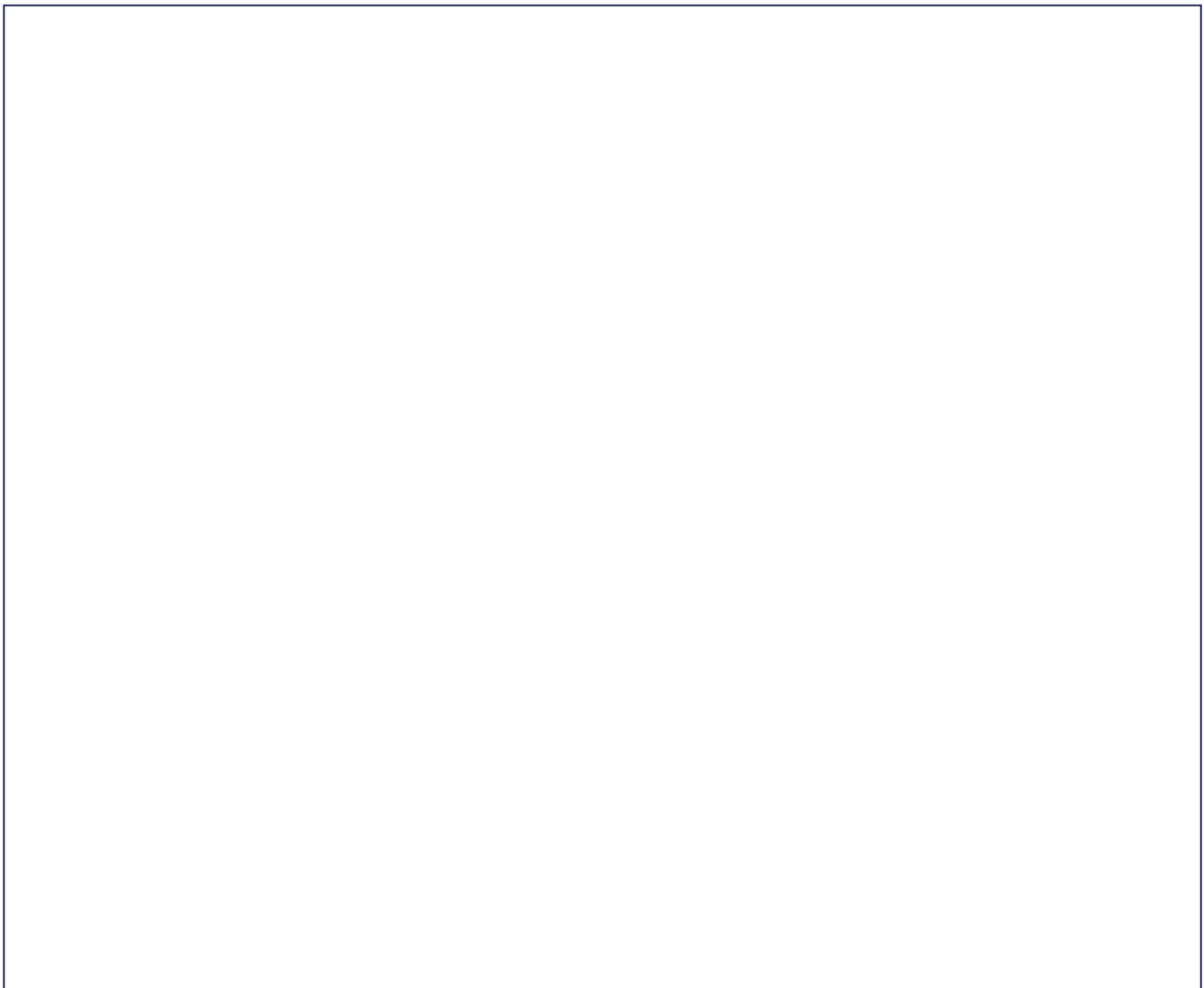


Champions of Equality: A Social Studies / History Drawing Sheet

Learning objective: To understand the significance of civil rights leaders and the peaceful methods used to advocate for fairness and equality in society.

Use your imagination to create a scene that captures the spirit of equality. Incorporate the items from the word bank into your drawing to show how people have stood up for their rights throughout history.

Draw: Create a detailed scene showing a community march for equality. Use a bold, illustrative style. Include a diverse group of people holding banners, wearing bright colours, and standing in a public space like a town square. Ensure there is a prominent sign that clearly displays one of the words from the word bank. Add details like signs with positive messages, people holding hands to show unity, and a clear, peaceful atmosphere.



Label words: Equality · Justice · Peaceful Protest · Unity · Courage · Human Rights · Fairness

Steps:

1. Step 1: Draw a group of people standing together to represent 'Unity'. Why is standing together more effective than acting alone?
2. Step 2: Label the sign in your drawing with one of the words from the word bank that represents the goal of a civil rights protest.

3. Step 3: Explain why peaceful protest is often considered a more powerful tool for change than conflict. Justify your answer.
4. Step 4: Draw a symbol of peace (like a dove or an olive branch) to represent the method of the movement. What might happen if a movement stopped using peaceful methods?
5. Step 5: Compare and contrast the way people fought for rights in the past versus how people might use technology to advocate for equality today.
6. Step 6: Ellie the elephant has a great memory for history. If she were to visit your drawing, which historical figure do you think she would be most proud of and why?
