

Ellie's Local Social Studies / History Investigation

Learning objective: To identify and describe historical changes in the local area and understand how local sites provide evidence about the past.

Join Ellie the elephant on a walk through time! Use your knowledge of local history to answer these questions about how our towns and villages have changed over the years.

Ellie's notes: Remember that a primary source is an item from the time being studied, like an old photograph or a diary entry. Changes in local areas are often driven by new industries or transport links like railways.

What might happen to a town's history if all the old maps and photographs were lost? 5. Research a local building in your town; identify one feature that suggests it was built in a different time period. 6. Imagine you have discovered an unknown artifact in your attic. Write a short diary entry from the perspective of the person who owned it 80 years ago.
