

Historical Inquiry: The Transatlantic Slave Trade

Learning objective: To understand the causes, experiences, and historical significance of the Transatlantic slave trade, as part of the Class 5 history curriculum.

1. The Triangular Trade: Explain the three journeys that made up the trade route between Europe, Africa, and the Americas. (3 marks)

2. Life on a Plantation: Describe the daily conditions and the type of work enslaved people were forced to perform. (3 marks)

3. Acts of Resistance: How did enslaved people show resistance or fight for their freedom despite the harsh conditions? (2 marks)

4. The Fight for Abolition: Who were the key individuals or groups that campaigned to end the slave trade, and what did they achieve? (3 marks)

5. Historical Reflection: Why is it important for us to learn about this period of history today? (2 marks)

Extension challenge: Imagine you are a historian documenting the past. Write a short paragraph explaining the long-term impact the abolition of slavery had on society.
