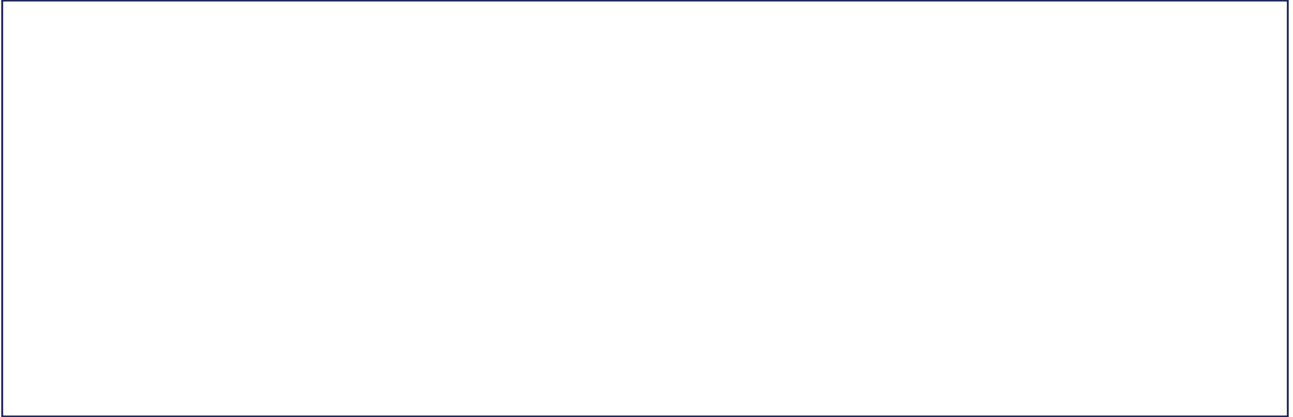
2. Why do you think the King's safety was considered so important to the people of 1605? (2 marks)
