

A Celebration of Eid al-Fitr

Learning objective: To understand the significance and traditions of Eid al-Fitr for Muslim communities.

Read the passage carefully and answer the questions below. Think about the values and traditions mentioned.

Eid al-Fitr, often called the 'Festival of Breaking the Fast', is a joyous occasion celebrated by Muslims worldwide. It marks the end of Ramadan, a holy month dedicated to reflection and fasting from dawn until sunset. During Ramadan, people focus on self-discipline and empathy for those who have less. When the new moon is sighted, the celebrations begin. Families wake up early to perform special prayers, often wearing their finest clothes. Homes are decorated with vibrant colours, and delicious feasts are prepared to share with neighbours and friends. A central part of the day is Zakat al-Fitr, where families give money or food to those in need, ensuring that everyone can join in the festivities. For many, it is a time to visit relatives, exchange gifts, and express gratitude for their blessings. Whether it is enjoying a traditional sweet treat or gathering for a community meal, the atmosphere is one of unity and peace. It is a time when the spirit of generosity shines brightly, reminding everyone of the importance of kindness and togetherness throughout the year.

5. Do you think the act of giving to charity is essential to the meaning of Eid? Justify your answer. (3 marks)
