

A Journey into Islamic Traditions with Ellie

Learning objective: To understand the core beliefs and practices of Islam, including the Five Pillars and the importance of the Mosque.

Read the text carefully with Ellie the elephant. Use your memory to answer the questions below, ensuring you provide reasons for your answers where required.

Ellie the elephant loves visiting the local community centre to learn about different faiths. Today, she is exploring Islam. Muslims believe in one God, Allah, and follow the teachings of the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him). Their holy book is the Qur'an, which is treated with great respect. A central part of a Muslim's life is the Five Pillars. These are five duties that help Muslims focus on their faith. They include Shahadah, the declaration of belief; Salah, which involves praying five times a day; and Zakat, the act of giving money to those in need. During the month of Ramadan, Muslims practise Sawm, which is fasting from dawn until sunset to show self-discipline. Finally, many hope to complete the Hajj, a pilgrimage to the sacred city of Makkah. Muslims often gather at a Mosque to pray together. Inside, there are no statues or pictures of people; instead, you will see beautiful, intricate geometric patterns on the walls. These patterns represent the infinite nature of God's creation, reminding everyone of the beauty and order found within the universe.
