Step into the bustling streets of the North – capture the rhythm of city life!

- Lowry often used a limited colour palette, focusing on white, black, red, yellow, and blue. Why might an artist choose to limit their colours when painting a busy city scene?
- His figures are famously known as 'matchstick men'. How does the simple shape of these figures change the way we view the people in his paintings?
- Lowry's paintings often show tall factory chimneys and smoking mills. How do these details help us understand what life was like in industrial Britain?
- The artist often ignored traditional rules of perspective, making buildings look like they were leaning or stacked. How does this technique affect the mood of the artwork?
- Lowry's sky is usually a flat, pale, or cloudy grey. What does this tell us about the weather and the environment of the places he depicted?

Did you know? Did you know? L.S. Lowry didn't just paint for fun; he worked as a rent collector for many years! This job meant he spent all day walking through busy industrial streets, observing the everyday lives of the people he later painted in his famous scenes.
