

Adventures with Adverbs

Learning objective: To identify and use adverbs to express time, place, and cause, and to improve the precision of sentences.

Read the story below about Max the monkey. Underline the adverbs you find, then answer the questions to test your knowledge of how adverbs describe actions.

Max the monkey was busy solving a complex maths puzzle. He sat patiently at his wooden desk, checking his work frequently to ensure he had not made a mistake. Yesterday, Max had struggled with the same problem, but today he felt much more confident. He looked upstairs to see if his friend Pip the caterpillar was ready to help. Suddenly, Max realised he had misplaced his pencil. He searched everywhere, looking under his books and behind his chair. He moved cautiously around the room, afraid of knocking over his ink pot. Consequently, he decided to stop and tidy his desk. Immediately, he spotted his pencil hiding right underneath his calculator.

1. Find and copy two adverbs from the text that tell us when an action happened. (2 marks)

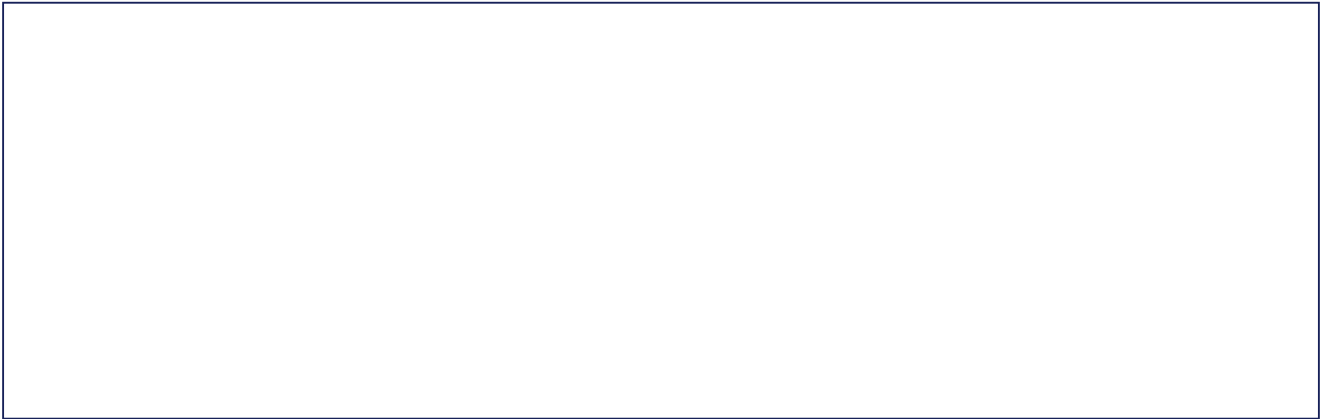
2. Which adverb in the text explains the cause or reason for Max tidying his desk? (1 mark)

3. Identify the adverb that describes where Max looked for his pencil. How does this word change the meaning of the sentence? (2 marks)

4. Rewrite this sentence using a different adverb to change the speed of the action: 'Max walked to the desk.' (2 marks)

5. Explain why writers use adverbs to describe verbs. Give an example using the verb 'ate'. (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a picture of Max the monkey searching for his pencil. Include a speech bubble showing Max looking 'everywhere' for his missing item.



Extension challenge: Write a short paragraph about your favourite hobby. Include at least four different adverbs to describe how, when, where, or why you do your activity.
