

Max's Marvelous Punctuation Puzzle

Learning objective: To understand and use colons and semicolons to link related independent clauses and introduce lists.

Read the text carefully below. Use your knowledge of Year 5 punctuation to answer the questions that follow. Remember to write in full sentences where required.

Max the monkey loves solving maths puzzles, but he also enjoys organising his desk. He often says, 'I need three things to finish my homework: a sharp pencil, a sturdy ruler, and my trusty calculator.' Max uses a colon to introduce his list of items. When he is not counting, Max likes to write stories about the jungle. He wrote two sentences that he wanted to join together: 'The sun was setting behind the tall mahogany trees' and 'The monkeys prepared to sleep in their leafy nests.' Because both sentences are independent clauses and relate to the same idea, Max used a semicolon to join them. He wrote: 'The sun was setting behind the tall mahogany trees; the monkeys prepared to sleep in their leafy nests.' By using a semicolon instead of a full stop, Max showed that the two ideas were closely linked. Punctuation acts like a map for the reader, guiding them through the twists and turns of a sentence. Whether he is using a colon to start a list or a semicolon to link thoughts, Max knows that correct punctuation makes his writing much easier to understand.

5. Do you think using different punctuation marks makes stories more interesting? Give a reason for your answer. (3 marks)
