

Year 5 English: The Easter Story Flashcards

Learning objective: To understand and recall key events, vocabulary, and themes from the Easter story as part of religious education and narrative comprehension.

Use these flashcards to test your knowledge of the Easter story. Read the term or question on the front, try to remember the definition or answer, then reveal the hidden side to check your understanding.

What is Palm Sunday?

The day that marks Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem, where people welcomed him by waving palm branches.

What was the Last Supper?

The final meal that Jesus shared with his disciples before his death, often associated with the tradition of breaking bread.

Who were the disciples?

The twelve close followers and students of Jesus who travelled and learned with him.

What is the significance of the Garden of Gethsemane?

The place where Jesus went to pray and reflect before he was arrested.

What is meant by the term 'Betrayal'?

An act of disloyalty; in the Easter story, this refers to Judas Iscariot identifying Jesus to the authorities for money.

What is the Crucifixion?

The historical method of execution used on Jesus on the day known as Good Friday.

What does 'Resurrection' mean?

The belief that Jesus rose from the dead three days after he was buried.

When is Easter Sunday celebrated?

The day Christians celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus, marking the end of the period of Lent.

What is Passover?

A Jewish festival that was being celebrated in Jerusalem at the same time as the events of the Easter story.

Why is the Easter story considered a narrative of hope?

Because it focuses on themes of forgiveness, new beginnings, and the belief in life after death.

What does 'Reflection' mean in this context?

Thinking deeply and carefully about the events of the story and their meaning to others.

What is an 'Empty Tomb'?

A key symbol in the Easter story representing the discovery that the burial place of Jesus was found empty on the third day.
