

Mastering Fronted Adverbials with Pip the Bookworm

Step into the story! Use fronted adverbials to bring your writing to life.

- A fronted adverbial is a word, phrase, or clause placed at the beginning of a sentence to describe the action that follows.
- Always remember to use a comma after your fronted adverbial to separate it from the main clause.
- Time adverbials tell us when something happens, such as: 'After the sun set, the stars appeared.'
- Place adverbials tell us where something happens, such as: 'Deep in the forest, the leaves rustled.'
- Manner adverbials tell us how something is done, such as: 'With a curious grin, Max the monkey solved the puzzle.'

Did you know? Did you know? Pip the Bookworm loves fronted adverbials because they act like a spotlight, highlighting when, where, or how an action happens right at the start of a sentence. By moving the adverbial to the front, you change the rhythm of your writing and keep your readers interested!
