Read the following report carefully and answer the questions. Ensure you use full sentences where required and check your spelling and punctuation.

3. What is the primary purpose of the 'by-line' in a newspaper report? (2 marks)

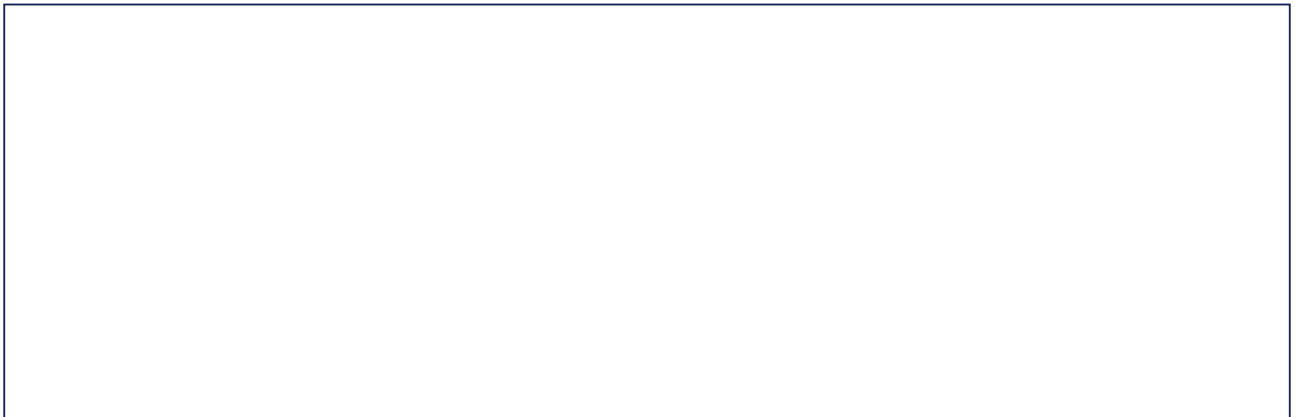
4. Find and copy one direct quote from the text. Why do journalists include direct quotes in their reports? (3 marks)

5. Identify one fact and one opinion from the passage. Explain the difference between the two. (4 marks)

6. Newspaper reports are written in the past tense. Rewrite this sentence in the past tense: 'The children run to the library to find their favourite books.' (2 marks)

7. Extended Writing Task: Write a short 'lead paragraph' (the orientation) for a newspaper report about a local funfair that arrived in town. Ensure you include the 5 Ws: Who, What, Where, When, and Why. (10 marks)
