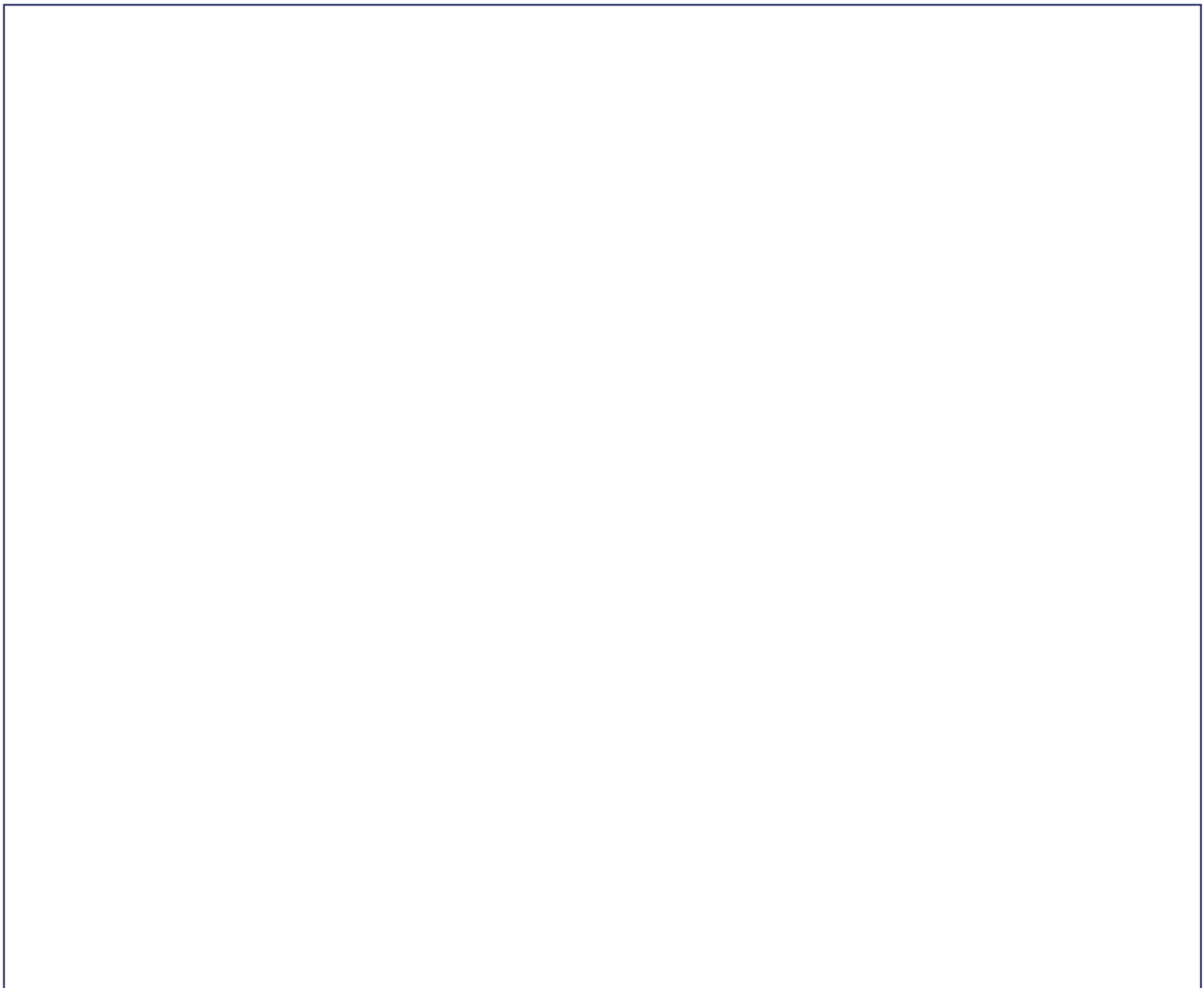


Reporting on the Rare Moon-Flower

Learning objective: To identify and illustrate the key structural features of a non-chronological report using Nova the Owl's scientific findings.

Imagine you are helping Nova the Owl document the discovery of a rare Moon-Flower. Use the space below to create a labelled scientific diagram. Ensure your drawing includes the key features of a report: a clear title, a sub-heading, and informative labels.

Draw: Draw a scientific, detailed sketch of a magical Moon-Flower. Use a clean, educational style similar to a textbook diagram. Ensure there is plenty of white space around the flower to add labels, a title at the top, a sub-heading, and a small box for 'Did you know?' facts.

Steps:

1. Step 1: Draw a large, glowing flower in the centre of your page. Label the 'Petals' and 'Stem' using scientific observations.
2. Step 2: Write a clear 'Title' at the top of your page that tells the reader exactly what the report is about.
3. Step 3: Add a 'Sub-heading' near the bottom to introduce a new section, such as 'Habitat' or 'Appearance'.
4. Step 4: Create a small 'Fact Box' in the corner of your drawing. Write one interesting fact about the Moon-Flower inside it.
