

Sentence Superstars: Year 1 Grammar Flashcards

Learning objective: To identify and use capital letters, full stops, and basic sentence structure according to the Year 1 English curriculum.

Read the front of the card to see the grammar challenge. Check the back of the card to see if you are correct! You can play this with a partner or practise on your own.

What do we always use at the very start of a sentence?	What do we put at the very end of a sentence to show it is finished?
A capital letter.	A full stop.
Max the monkey is writing a sentence. What should he put between his words so they do not squish together?	True or False: A sentence must make sense on its own.
Finger spaces.	True.
Which of these is a sentence? A) The cat. B) The cat sat on the mat.	Pip the caterpillar wrote: 'the sun is hot'. What is missing at the start?
B) The cat sat on the mat.	A capital letter (The).
Add a full stop to this sentence: 'Leo the lion roared'	Zara the zebra is writing a list of colours. Does she need a full stop after every single word?
Leo the lion roared.	No, only at the end of the sentence.
What is a 'noun'?	What is a 'verb'?
A naming word for a person, place, or thing.	An action word (like jump, run, or eat).
Fix this sentence: 'nova looks at stars'	How many capital letters should be in this sentence: 'Finn the dolphin swims in the sea.'
Nova looks at stars.	One (at the start of the sentence).
