Learning objective: To understand the characteristics of settlements, including urban, rural, and coastal features, and how land use changes over time.

What might happen if a large city grew so quickly that it ran out of green space? 4. Explain why some coastal settlements have declined in population over time. 5. If you were a town planner, how would you ensure your settlement remains sustainable? 6. Design a new settlement for a future planet and describe how your choice of location supports the people living there.
