6. 6. What do we call a sequence of shots between players? A) Rally* B) Match C) Set D) Game (1 mark)

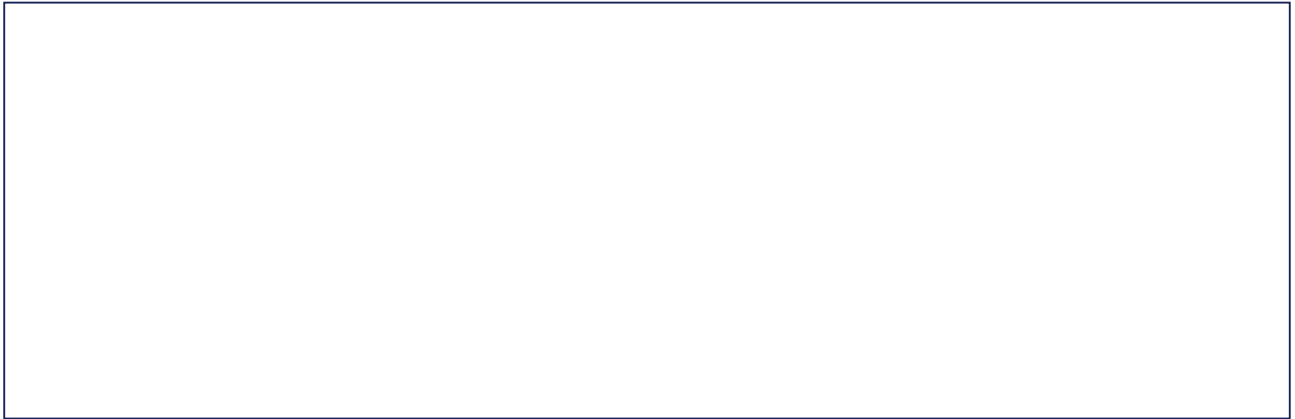
7. 7. What is the term for hitting the ball before it bounces on the ground? (1 mark)

10. 10. What is a 'fault' in a serving situation? (1 mark)

What skills are the same? 3. Justify why communication is vital when playing a doubles match. 4. What might happen if the net in a game of badminton were set too high? 5. If a club charges £8 for a racket hire, how many rackets can you hire with £40? 6. Design a new rule for a net game that would make it more difficult for the server. How would this change the game's flow?
