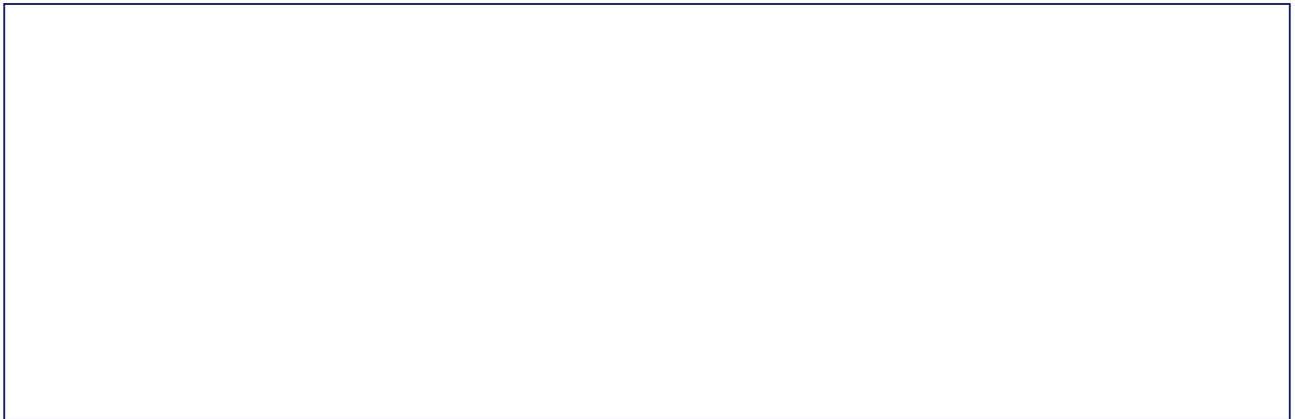
7. 7. True or False: Zakat is the name of the festival that marks the end of Ramadan. (1 mark)
