

Rosa's Spanish Number Fact-File

Learning objective: To identify and write Spanish numbers from 1 to 100, and use them to describe quantities in a real-world context.

Join Rosa the parrot on a linguistic adventure! Use this fact-file to practise your Spanish numbers. Fill in the sections below to show how you would use these numbers to manage a shop, count items, or describe your age and birthday. Remember to use the word bank to help with your spelling.

Word bank: uno (1) · diez (10) · veinte (20) · treinta (30) · cuarenta (40) · cincuenta (50) · cien (100) · y (and) · ¿Cuántos? · cuesta

1. My Birthday Age: Write your current age in Spanish and then write the age you will be next year in Spanish. (2 marks)

2. The Shop Inventory: Imagine you have a stall selling fruit. If you have 35 apples and 42 oranges, write these quantities in Spanish. (2 marks)

3. Price Tag Challenge: If a toy costs £25 and a book costs £12, write these prices in Spanish using the word 'cuesta' (costs). (3 marks)

4. Mathematical Translation: Solve this sum in English first ($40 + 20 = 60$), then write the full calculation out in Spanish words. (2 marks)

5. Number Pattern: Write down the sequence of tens in Spanish from ten to one hundred (diez to cien). (3 marks)

Extension challenge: Choose three numbers between 50 and 100. Write a short sentence for each, describing how many of your favourite items you would like to have (e.g., 'Tengo sesenta libros' - I have sixty books).
