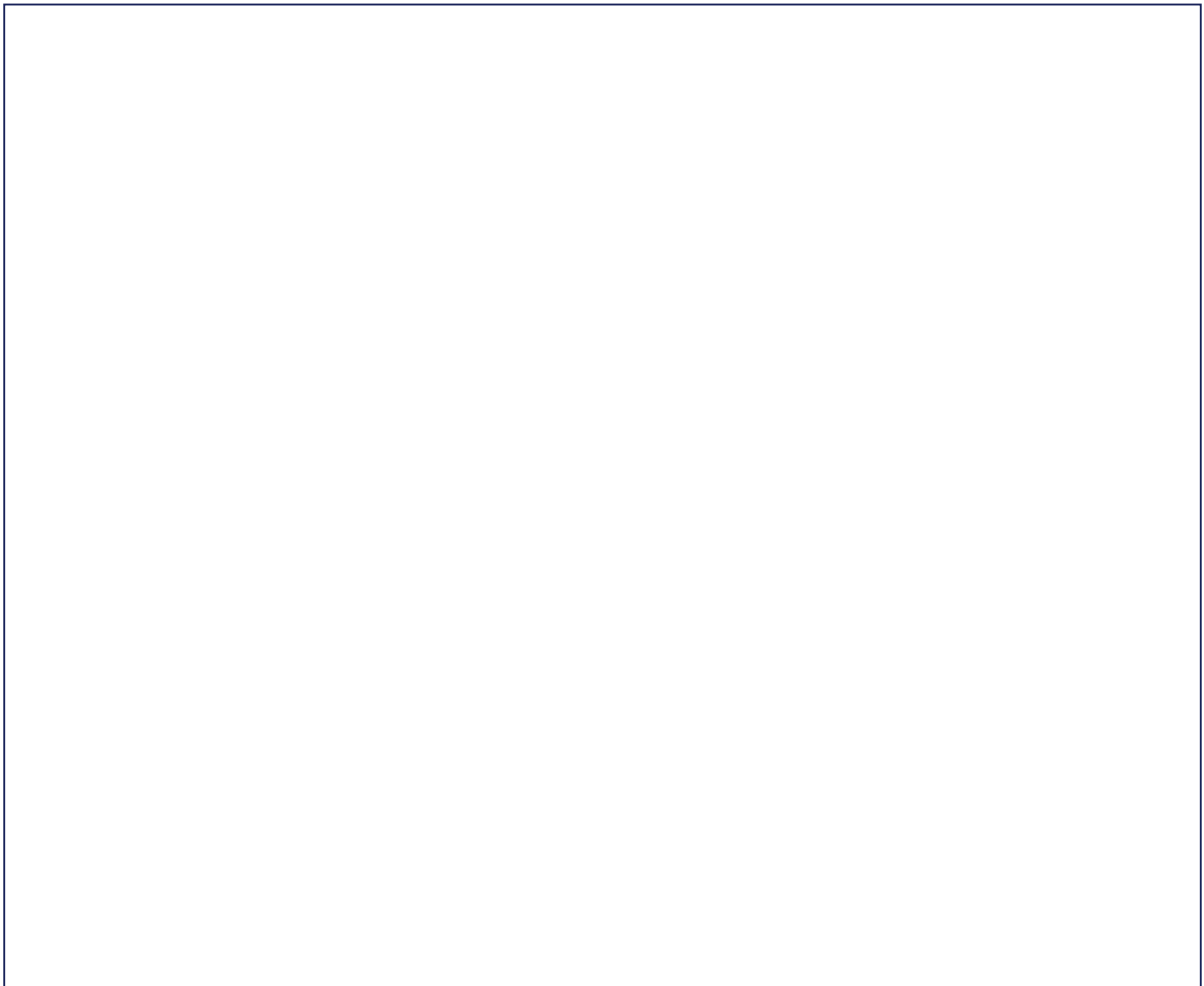


Exploring Impressionism with Zara the Zebra

Learning objective: To understand the Impressionist style by using short, visible brushstrokes and light to capture a moment in time.

Follow Zara the Zebra's guide to create your own Impressionist-style landscape. Focus on how light changes the colors of objects rather than drawing sharp outlines.

Draw: Draw a local park or garden scene as if you are standing outside at sunset. Use a variety of short, thick brushstrokes (or pencil marks) to show movement. Focus on capturing the 'flicker' of light on leaves or water. Do not use a black pen for outlines; instead, define the shapes of trees and flowers using contrasting colors like deep blues, purples, or warm oranges.

Steps:

1. Why did Impressionist artists prefer to use small, visible brushstrokes instead of smooth, blended lines?
2. Look at your drawing. Which color did you use to represent the sunlight, and why did you choose it?
3. Label the part of your drawing where you used 'broken color' (placing two unmixed colors side-by-side).
4. Step 1: Sketch the horizon line lightly in pencil.
5. Step 2: Apply your sky colors using short, quick dashes rather than long strokes.
